Welcome to our native and nursery plants section!

Click Syringa picture below where you can find all of your natives, grasses, shade trees, and other specialty non- native stock.

Philadelphus lewisii (above), also known as Lewis's mockorange, is probably better known in Idaho as *Syringa*, where it is the state flower.

Why buy native plants/ benefit of native plants:

- Already adapted to the local area so survivability is increased.
- Adapted to the soil. Adapted to the heat and cold of an area (hardiness zone)(click here for hardiness zone map of Idaho).
- Lower maintenance costs because natives are adapted to the landscape and require fewer resources, such as water. They create wildlife sanctuaries, especially for the native wildlife associated with those plants. Natives will reduce weed invasion as they out- compete invasive species. (go to our web links page for more resources on native plants, hardiness zones in the US, and much more!)

Most species in our stock are native to

Idaho and can be found throughout the western and rocky mountain states.

Populus tremuloides(Quaking Aspen) turning.

Spirea douglasii (Douglas spirea),
an Idaho native with it's classic pink blooms.

Acer ginnala (Amur maple), with brilliant fall color. Picea pungens 'glauca' (Colorado Blue spruce)
is native to a portion of SE Idaho.

Spirea betulifolia (Mountain spirea)
with a white glow.

Arctostaphylos uva-ursi (Kinnikinnick) is a popular evergreen shrub.
